

The NDGW California Image Awards

The California Image Awards honor individuals, businesses, and organizations that help preserve and tell California's history, and work to make its future bright. The nominations come from Parlors and Sisters all around the state. Those nominations are reviewed by the Public Relations Committee; this year's nominations were very well prepared and were a delight to read and review.

Here are the 2022 NDGW California Image Award recipients:

Pat Pattison — host of "Best of California with Pat Pattison" — Nominated by Grace Parlor No. 242

Pat Pattison is a native Californian, whose family has been in the Golden State since the 1890's. He is also a former Disney executive. Pat's warm and charismatic style makes all his guests comfortable, and his knowledge and natural curiosity make his questions interesting to both the guests and viewers. The show is viewed on local television stations all around California, and across the country ... as well as on YouTube and Facebook. Pat promotes California through travel, historic sights, famous events, unique businesses, and fascinating people all throughout the Golden State.

He is also supportive of the Native Daughters of the Golden West, having attended Grace Parlor's Home Luncheon, and described as a "complete joy to have" as their guest.

Cypress Lawn Heritage Foundation—Nominated by San Bruno Parlor No. 246

Colma, California is known for the many cemeteries that exist there. So much so, that the police cars have a bumper sticker that reads: "It's great to be alive in Colma!" But, if you just drive by the park-like cemetery of Cypress Lawn, you'd be missing the opportunity of a lifetime. The Cypress Lawn Heritage Foundation hosts free trolley tours of their memorial park, and monthly lectures open to the public.

According to their website, "Cypress Lawn is the final resting place of more prominent Californians than any other cemetery in the West."

Among the California notables who now reside at Cypress Lawn, are:

Hiram Johnson — Governor and Senator from California, and who ran as Teddy Roosevelt's Vice President in the 1912 election.

The first and only U.S. California Counsel General to Mexico, Thomas Larkin, who was instrumental in forging the state of California and writing its constitution.

Gladys Hansen — long time archivist for the City of San Francisco who spent much of her life researching and identifying those lost in the 1906 Great Quake.

And, someone who doesn't need much of an introduction, William Randolph Hearst. Clover Sonoma — Nominated by Petaluma Parlor No. 222

Clover Sonoma — formerly known as Clover Stornetta Farms — is a locally owned and operated dairy processor in Petaluma, California. It started out small, in 1916 and is now under the leadership of the third generation - Marcus Benedetti. Besides specializing in organic and conventional dairy products, they have promoted the importance of agriculture, family farms, and stewardship of the land. In addition to making California a more delicious and sustainable place to live, they bring smiles to many faces through their mascot — Clo the Cow.

Clo was introduced in 1969 as a cartoon cow, with a huge smile and witty puns. She is featured on billboards and milk tankers, using milk-based puns like... "Outstanding in her Field," and "Sip, Sip, Hooray."

For generations, Clover Sonoma has been a partner with their community through their "Clover Cares Program." In 2020, Clover Sonoma donated \$100,000 to Petaluma Valley Hospital to purchase much-needed ventilators and critical supplies during the COVID pandemic. Rounding out our California Image Awards is...

The Filoli Historic House and Garden — Nominated by the Public Relations Committee Filoli Historic House and Garden — is a bucolic 16 acres in Woodside, California, just a

quick 25-minute drive south of San Francisco. The Georgian-revival-styled mansion took three years to complete, and the Bourne's — William and Agnes — began living there in 1917.

A visit to Filoli takes you back in time, but also into familiar movies and television. The property was a film location for the Warren Beatty film, Heaven Can Wait. The house was featured in the 1997 film, George of the Jungle, though it is probably most famously recognized for being the exterior of the Carrington mansion in the television prime-time soap opera, Dynasty.

The Filoli name is an acronym from the first two letters of the key words in William Bourne's personal creed: FIght for a just cause. LOve your fellow man. LIve a good life.

It now is a treasure enjoyed by visitors from all over the world. The Filoli Historic House and Garden serves the community through classes, specialized tours, and increasing accessibility for all, as part of the Museums for All program, which provides low-cost admission.

Grace Parlor Celebrates Official Visit of Susan Collins and 95th Anniversary

On June 11, 2022, the Members and guests of Grace Parlor No. 242 celebrated the Official Visit of Susan Collins and the 95th anniversary of the Parlor's institution. The cruise left port at the Knott's Berry Farm Hotel where Captain Rosa Lindholm welcomed "All Aboard" the U.S.S. Grace No. 242 to honor Admiral,



Susan Collins, Grand President. The tables were decorated in shades of blue and aqua with lighthouses and sea shells. The invocation was given by Retired Admiral Joan Hall, P.G.P. and the flag salute was led by Lieutenant Rae Rosas, Grand Marshal.

The program included a list of all Grace Parlor's current Members and Past Presidents, along with a brief Parlor history. One notable piece of history was a plaque dedicated in 1952. The Knott's Berry Farm Ghost Town was marked by Grace Parlor No. 242 N.D.G.W. and Mother Colony No. 281 N.S.G.W. Since that time, it has been a tradition for Grace Parlor to hold the Official Visit of the Grand President at Knott's. The Berry Farm plaque was relocated to the south wall of the Gold Trails Hotel in 2009 to make way for the GhostRider coaster. By chance or by fate, the plaque was recently used in social media marketing to celebrate the opening of summer 2022, which correlated with the 70th anniversary of the original marking.

After the infamous Knott's Berry Farm lunch, Lieutenant Commander and Recording Secretary, Judi Smedley, presented Admiral Susan Collins with the report book and gifts from the Parlor. Membership awards were given to all Grace Parlor Members, and Honorary Members, in attendance. Special awards recognized 50 year member, Bunny Jones, plus 25 year members John Avery, Rene Manatt and Jacki Weaver. The assembly was generous in their donations for the coin march benefitting the Grand President's special project. Also in attendance were Lieutenants Junior Grade Marti Noyes, S.D.D.G.P., Jurupa No. 296, Riverside and G.T. Viola Gene Dana, D.G.P., Rancho La Puente No. 331, La Puente, along with many friends and sisters from local Parlors.

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

Special Days of the Order are as follows: Arbor Day in the spring; Poppy Day, April 6; Mother's Day; Memorial Day; Flag Day, June 14; Admission Day and Pioneer Day, September 9; Constitution Day, September 17; Founders' Day and Native Daughters of the Golden West Childrens Foundation Day, September 25; and Thanksgiving Day.

The week before Mother's Day is designated as Native Daughters of the Golden West civic week. The month of September is designated as Native Daughters of the Golden West membership month, and each Subordinate Parlor should plan activity to attract eligible individuals from the community to our Order.

These are dates that you can plan to have Parlor activities at meeting or as a special event. Arbor Day do a plant exchange-bring something from your garden; Poppy Day plant poppy seeds; Mother's Day put together a basket of goodies and take it to a Sister who is a shut in and doesn't get out; Founders Day have a birthday party for the Order and invite prospective members & complete the membership month event. In honor of Grand President Susan Collins, Donner Parlor No. 193 held our Official Visit at Marsh Creek State Historic Park in Brentwood on May 21, 2022.

For those who arrived a bit early we were graced with a herd of cattle being moved onto the property and were left grazing in the neighboring field.

Under a majestic oak tree on the front steps of the Gothic Revival John Marsh Stone House, a picnic was held at the newest 3,659-acre State Park, that is currently not open to the public. Photo boards were placed in front of the house showing volunteer reconstruction efforts. An insightful and engaging presentation was given by three John Marsh members for about an hour on the history of the land and John Marsh himself. The trust is trying to receive grants to help with reconstruction of the Stone House and the development of an interpretive center. Currently a dedication plaque for the John Marsh House, donated by Donner Parlor, is on the main road near the entrance we are working to have it moved closer to the stone house. A homemade picnic lunch was provided by Donner Parlor. Attendees were given a tour of the John Marsh House with a peek inside. We concluded the Official Visit with a donation to the Trustee group. 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Petaluma Parlor No. 222 Celebrates 100 Years!

Petaluma Parlor No. 222 was established one hundred years ago. At that time, the world was a very different place than the one we live in now. Women lived very simple lives. They married, and their traditional role was to take care of their husbands and their children. They stayed at home, and did all the cooking, cleaning, and made the families clothes themselves. They helped in the fields, milked cows and collected eggs.

But the women of that time had a desire for independence in their lives. They wanted to have something of their own in their social lives, without their families! How dare they?! The Native Daughters of the Golden West was an opportunity for them to be involved with other women in their community. Petaluma women started a local parlor in 1922, and women began joining. It was so liberating for the females of these times to have a woman's group to connect with.

So, for 100 years, the women of the Petaluma Parlor No. 222 have had an active role in the community. Things have changed since those early days. I remember when I first joined ND, in 1970, 52 years ago. All the formal rituals were followed, with stations and podiums for the officers, the formal entry of the officers wearing their regalia, the ritual of opening and closing the Bible, and the marching. For Official Visits, everyone HAD to wear long formals. You could not cross your legs during the meetings. There were card parties and luncheons. Our famous Spaghetti dinners began as our fundraiser over 50 years ago. Many families looked forward to the homemade spaghetti sauce and the fabulous raffle we held. And I can still hear the hum of all the socializing with the many local families in attendance. - We supported our local Cancer Society's Relay for Life, preparing and serving spaghetti dinners to the participants.
- For Admission Day on September 9, we have set up informational tables at Petaluma Public Library and Petaluma Historical Museum to educate the public about California's admission to the Union on September 9, 1924. Remember getting the day off from school? Nowadays, our kids don't even know what Admission Day is! We wanted to educate and remind our community what a special day this is. We handed out small California Bear flags to everyone, as well as information about our state bird, the California Quail; state flower, the Golden Poppy; state tree, the Redwood; the State animal, the Grizzly Bear...anyone know our state insect??? the Dog-Face Butterfly!

beauty of a California beach and fishing off Pismo pier with vacation memories of his beloved grandparents. In his charming and endearing essay, Joseph teaches all of us that California's Wonders are also written in the hearts of its people as much as painted on Pacific sunsets. Reminding us to "write what you know", Joseph proves it really does make a difference.

In addition to this Fall issue of the Star publishing the winners, NDGW's Website will post the essays as well. This is another upgrade of the 2021-2022 State Essay Committee: to give these young people their first publishing opportunity. Imagine how that looks on a college or job application.

In 2021, State Essay Committee members Stephanie Whittle (Toluca Parlor No. 279), Sue Fitzpatrick (Vendome Parlor No. 100) and Joelle Dobrow (Toluca Parlor No. 279) suspended the Essay Contest for one year. Instead, they took advantage of pandemic down time to revise and contemporize the State Essay Contest. The committee experimented with changing the contest title from "Wonders of California" to "What Makes California Wonderful?" This minor change keeps pace with California teaching standards by inviting students to respond to a writing prompt rather than a statement. With the help of Master English Teacher Heather Fogg (Joaquin Parlor No. 5), the experimental title was Beta tested by over 200 students. Students had a choice which title to write about. The new title proved a verifiable, refreshing stimulus.

Heather Fogg further guided the committee by developing standardized rubrics. Customized rubrics were distributed to students at each grade level for use during the 2021 Beta tests and 2022 Parlor essay submissions. What is a rubric? Good question. A rubric is a teacher's scoring guide used to evaluate performance, a product, or a project. It has three parts: 1) performance criteria 2) rating scale and 3) indicators. A rubric defines what is expected and what will be assessed. It indicates that students will be evaluate according to specified criteria, making grading and ranking simpler and more transparent. Rubrics mean that all parlors can evaluate essay submissions using standardized criteria. The rubrics are meant to help not hinder the essay judging process

It wasn't until 1989 when the Essay Contest was formalized as a statewide competition. Prior to then individual parlors were conducting essay contests without centralized coordination. At the 1989 GPAM, the contest was added as a subsection to the California History and Landmarks Committee. At the time, official rules were heavy on format and timelines but light on creativity and content. Using a rubric was not even imagined. After 33 years, a total revamp was sorely needed.

The goal was to make the competition more appealing and relevant. Early in Grand President Susan Collins' (2021-2022) administration, she authorized the State Essay Committee to conduct a 1-year pilot program to use the new title and other innovations. The 2022 State Essay Committee encouraged all Parlors to appoint their own Parlor Essay Committees and invite local 4th through 8th grade students to compete writing to the prompt: What Makes California Wonderful? Essay competition packets containing the new rubrics were distributed in February.

The new title prompt is an effort to shift future submissions toward reaching for the spark of what inspires them and by osmosis encourage them to write an inspiring essay. This year's essay winners prove that goal is within reach.

Today, Ivey Silveira (4th grade), Avery Viera (7th grade), and Joseph Freitas (6th grade), reflect their achievements back on Native Daughters of the Golden West. We hope to see their future work shine in print and on the screen as well.

What Makes California Wonderful Ivey Silveira, 4th Grade

California is wonderful for many reasons, including its natural beauty and farming. One of my favorite places to visit is San Luis Reservoir, which is an artificial lake on San Luis Creek, located in Los Banos, Merced County. It has a surface area of 12,700 acres.

Water was always very important for central valley history. San Luis Reservoir helps preserve animals and plants. and has many outdoor recreations and supplies water to many places, including Santa Clara and Los Angeles counties. Nowadays the most important farming in our valley are dairies and crops oftomatoes, cotton and almonds.

The main recreations at San Luis Reservoir are camping, picnicking, swimming, fishing, boating, hunting, and trails. Pacheco Pass is called historic because it's part of the El Camino Real and also because it's close to San Luis Reservoir, a popular summer destination to go to during the summer. The Romero Visitor Center is where we can learn about San Luis Reservoir

The Central Valley was home to the three different Yokuts Native American: the Southern, Foothill, and Northern Valley. In 1805 the Spanish army Lieutenant Gabriel Moraga and his troops were the first non-natives to enter this area that came to scout potential mission sites.

In 1843 the Mexican government granted El Rancho San Luis Gonzaga a vast expanse of grasslands that include the present reservoir area to Juan Perez Pacheco. After the 1848 gold discovery the estimated number of gold diggers was 300,000. They were looking for more gold to get rich quickly. They had a San Joaquin and Kings river canal company build an irrigation canal from Mendota Dam to Los Banos Creek that soon grew to 180 miles long in length.

On August 18th, 1962 the 35th president of the United States, John F. Kennedy came to Los Banos to do the ground-breaking ceremonies for the San Luis Dam.It was finished in 1967, it took around 5 years to be completed. The San Luis Reservoir is the fifth largest reservoir in California and the fourth largest artificial dam in the United States. The national weather service has had a weather station at the San Luis Dam since 1963. There are state park peace officers in cars, motorcycles, off highway vehicles, and vessels watching to make sure people follow the laws.

I wish that my teacher one day can take our class to San Luis Reservoir Visitor Center to learn more about it and see how it makes California wonderful. I think it is a wonderful part of California.

I also like to collect the beautiful rocks that you can find when you walk on the trails. They have beautiful colors and shapes. The view from the trails is beautiful.

NDGW Childrens Foundation Works for California's Children

The Childrens Foundation Committee has been assisting children with special medical needs that are not covered by insurance or other financial aid since the 1950s. That's 70 years! Imagine how many children we had helped in that time! Well, we don't have to imagine. We know we have assisted over 6,600 children with individual grants and many, many more children havebenefitted from our Camperships. The Foundation serves any child in California of average income families who find that the medical needs of their children, whether they are physical or material, exceed their financial means. While health care for children residing in California has greatly improved, there are still children in need who are slipping through the cracks and the Childrens Foundation focuses on directly helping these families.

The NDGW Childrens Foundation Committee has supported some of California's children this past year. There is a great need for van lifts to allow children's wheel chairs to be lifted into vehicles. This year, we have helped provide funds to 8 families who needed a van lift to transport their child. When children are small, the parents can easily transfer their child into their vehicles. But as the child gets bigger, and the parents get older, it becomes very difficult to load their child into the family vehicle for things like doctor appointments and family outings. The van lifts are life-changing but very costly. Helping to offer financial support to these families is very important and we are happy to be of help. Cost: \$8000

The Foundation has given grants to several children who have needed specialized equipment this year, including:

Little Evie, 11 months old, needed a specialized cranial reshaping helmet to protect her bones before they had a chance to fuse. Kaiser only covered part of the cost. We were able to support her family in acquiring one. Cost: \$1,575

Aushay is a sweet 12 year old boy who has Cerebral Palsy, Autism and severe epilepsy. He has been suffering with 40-80 seizures per day, many of them very serious. His mother applied for a specialized "Cozy Bed" that has monitors to alert the family of any seizures or if he stops breathing during the night. His mother tells us this has been a life-changer for

Aushay and the family, as they now can sleep assured that they will be awakened if Aushay needs attention. Cost: \$7,155

Conner is a 9-year-old boy who has cerebral palsy. His family requested a specialized bike that would help him exercise and


be able to allow him to get around without aid. He very much wants independence for himself and this bike will enable him be more independent from others. Cost: \$1,664

In addition to our individual grants, we are also very excited to have offered many children the opportunity to attend summer camp this year through our Camperships and our Non-Profit Organizational Grants. These programs allow children access to the wonderful world of summer camp, despite their special needs.

Camperships are awarded to California camps that welcome children with a variety of special needs. Imagine being a child with diabetes, who has to have insulin shots on a daily basis. How they stand out at school and among their peers. And then they get to go to summer camp for a week. A week where they are among children just like them. Where getting a shot, or checking your blood sugar is "normal." Add to that the fun of summer camp - swimming, arts and crafts, campfire songs. Just like our grants awarded to individual children where the money goes directly to the service or to the vendor providing the device, the Campership goes to the Camp for the use they applied for, to benefit children

Here are some recent Campership recipients we awarded this year:

Enchanted Hills: It was the first camp of its kind on the West Coast when it was created back in 1950. It's goal is to provide an environment where children with a visual impairment can explore, thrive, and gain confidence. It is located in Napa, and is run

by Lighthouse for the Blind.

Giant Steps is a therapeutic equestrian center in Sonoma County. Often when one has physical or emotional impairments, horseback riding helps with balance, following directions, building strength, motor skills, developing bonds, and confidence. Giant Steps is located in Petaluma.

Camp Nugget takes place on the campus of Cal State Long Beach. The camp counselors are all Kinesiology students overseen by professional kinesiology faculty and staff. They welcome children allowing them to experience sports and activities adapted specifically to them and their ability – activities which might be limited to them at other camps.

The John Tracy Center works with children with hearing impairments. It was named after the son of two actors — Louise and Spencer Tracy. John was discovered to be deaf at 10-months of age. Spencer and Louise raised him as though he were any other child, and John grew up thriving. Louise Tracy devoted her time to studying communication styles that would be workable with a child who couldn't hear. That work eventually led to the creation of the John Tracy Center, based in Los Angeles. They applied for one of our Non-Profit Organizational Grants to help them develop a Hearing Aid Loan Program for children. More recently, they applied to us again, this time using our grant to help fund an "early intervention program for infants" — to help identify hearing issues earlier in life.

In 2022, in addition to our individual cases

— we were able to make Campership grants to 18 camps to support children with special needs. Each of these camps received \$2000, and each of them will be serving between 30 to 100 children in California this summer, and many more over the years.

While all these programs make a massive difference for the children they serve, think about the impact on their families. When we can fill that gap between financial need, and insurance coverage, imagine the load that can lift from the parents' shoulders, the independence and confidence experienced by the child with the new device or service, and the ability for siblings to have their family feel secure again. Also, camps allow kids to learn more about themselves, new techniques towards independence, and the social aspect of being around kids with the same challenges they face.

How do we know when a child needs our help? That's where YOU come in. As you gather with family and friends over the summer, talk about our Childrens Foundation. Who knows? Maybe your cousin's neighbor has a child who's in need of a particular device in order to be able to move more easily, or speech therapy, or counseling, or a special bed that tracks their heart rate and breathing, or access to a medication that isn't covered by their insurance. You can help that family access the grant application on our website, and you - as a Native Daughter - can contact any one of your Sisters who serve on the Childrens Foundation Committee, and help to jump-start their case.

The Native Daughters of the Golden West Childrens Foundation also has a fairly new Facebook page. If you go to the "Contact Us" on the Facebook page, it will also take you to the grant application.

We need you. Not only through your generous donations, for which we are very grateful, but also to connect us with children in California who could use our help.
